ARC READING COACH POSITION OVERVIEW

The ARC is dedicated to addressing the needs of the diverse and unique nontraditional students at GS. Our goal is to help enable students to maximize their educational experiences at Columbia; we provide an extensive range of academic support services free of charge to help GS students become independent learners and foster accountability for their learning processes.

Job Description

Reading Coaches perform a variety of responsibilities, including but not limited to:

- Helping students develop strategies for approaching and conquering challenging readings
- Helping students understand the differing demands made by different types of reading assignments (i.e., how to approach a literary text versus a textbook versus a historical document versus a critical article)
- Helping students understand how to efficiently manage large volumes of reading
- Being present and on time for all tutoring appointments, required training, and team meetings
- Attend professional development workshops throughout the semester
- Maintaining accurate records and completing all required paperwork
- Communicating frequently with the assistant dean and administrative coordinator
- Helping strategize and develop new resources that can be offered by the ARC
- Participate in peer observation and feedback structure to facilitate ongoing development

Minimum Qualifications

The ideal Reading Coach will:

- Have an overall GPA of 3.0 or better
- Possess excellent interpersonal and communication skills
- Possess excellent critical reading skills
- Be comfortable working with a diverse student population
- Be comfortable approaching texts from diverse disciplines, especially those in the humanities and social sciences
- Be assertive, able to take control of the coaching session and provide appropriate constructive feedback to students
- Demonstrate excellent time management skills and be able to work well independently
- Be willing to commit to at least one semester of work with the ARC

Benefits and Compensation

ARC employees are paid an hourly wage according to their previous educational experience. Current undergraduate students are paid \$23 per hour, and current graduate and postbac students are paid \$25 per hour. There are no insurance benefits attached to this position.

Additional benefits include:

- Increased mastery of academic skills
- Development of interpersonal skills
